Puberty blockers presented without risks

On Australian Story, Dr Michelle Telfer claims that puberty blockers are safe and reversible. The effects of puberty blockers include osteoporosis, cognitive delay, and infertility. These drugs are used to treat end-stage prostate cancer and to chemically castrate sex offenders. They are not available on PBS for blocking puberty. ABC does not include any warnings about these risks.

Who is Keira Bell?

The ABC failed to report on Bell v Tavistock – a landmark case in the UK where the High Court found that under 16 children cannot consent to puberty blockers. 1 December 2020

It is an ideology that harms women and children.

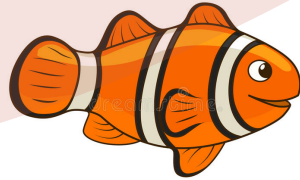

ABC has established a pattern of bias & inaccuracies in its reporting of gender issues

Factual inaccuracies about sex

ABCQueer, an Instagram account operated by the ABC, published a post stating “Some men have periods”.

The audience of ABCQueer is primarily young people.



Drag queen reinforces regressive stereotypes about gender

In the segment “Kids Talk About Gender” on Instagram, Shane Jenek tells children that gender means dressing in wigs and high heels.

He reinforces regressive gender stereotypes that boys like football and girls like dresses.



Dressed as ‘Courtney’ he talks about Shane as if he were a separate person. But tells children to just be happy as themselves.

We call on ABC to restore balance and represent women

No balance on trans inclusion in women’s sports

Between 2018 and 2021, ABC published 30 articles and interviews about transgender weightlifter Laurel Hubbard.

Only ONE article gave voice to women’s concerns about safety and fairness.



No women interviewed about women’s sports

ABC routinely interviews trans women (i.e. males) about whether it is fair and safe for them to play in women’s sport.

ABC have never interviewed a female sportswoman on the question. Save Womens Sports, Tracey Lambrechts and Anna Van Bellinghen were all vocal about Laurel Hubbard participating in the Tokyo Olympics, for example, and none were interviewed by ABC.

Promoting incarceration of males in women’s prisons

ABC has run several articles, a special graphic feature and a podcast to promote transferring males to women’s prisons.

No voice for women

The ABC refuses to give a voice to the women who defend our sex-based rights; or those who question the medicalisation of children. This is a clear failure to provide unbiased reporting.



ABC Editorial Policy

ABC’s editorial policies commit it to independence, integrity and responsibility (Policy 1), factual accuracy (Policy 2) and impartiality (Policy 4). The ABC is not adhering to these principles in its treatment of issues around gender identity ideology.

We call on the ABC to present accurate information about women and cover issues around transgenderism with impartiality, responsibility, independence, and integrity.
